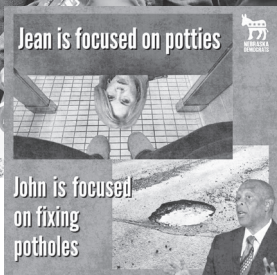

What this division has uncovered is that beneath the layers of party, race,

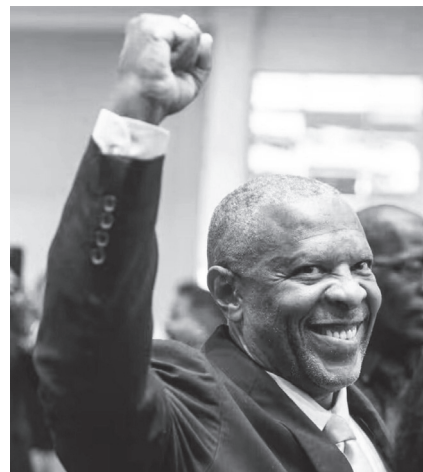
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A MESSAGE FROM JOHN EWING JR.

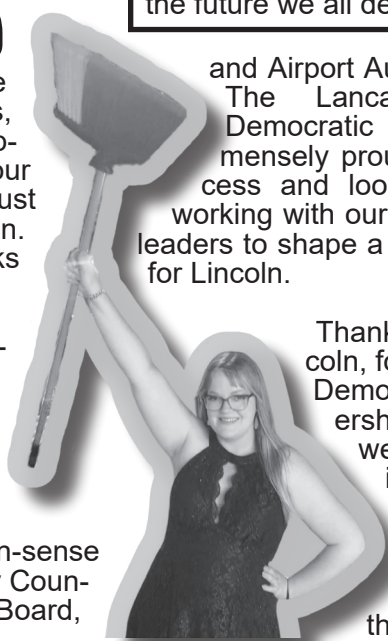
I want to extend my deepest gratitude to the countless volunteers and supporters who made this victory possible. Whether you

OMAHA SHOWS THE POWER OF THE BLUE DOT

This is just the beginning of what's to come from Nebraska's county democratic parties in 2026. Democrats across our state are choosing courage over cynicism. We want competence over chaos. We choose collaboration over division. In doing so, we can build something our skeptics cannot ignore.

A NOTE FROM CHAIR KLEEB

Take note. We're flipping seats and building the party.

Democrats in Nebraska are making waves in state and national politics. We are showing the Republicans that underestimating us is a mistake. We are leading by example, taking our message to the people and organizing all across the state and the country.

I have been honored to serve as your State Party Chair since 2017, and earlier this year, I was elected as the Association of State Democratic Committees (ASDC) President, and in the process, became the Democratic National Committee's (DNC) Vice Chair. Ken Martin, the DNC Chair, and I are fully committed to rebuilding the national and state party infrastructure and messaging. We've already taken bold steps to fund red state parties at \$270,000 a year, compared to just \$30,000 several years ago, when more money was concentrated in DC rather than on the ground where we win elections.

Our NDP Executive Director, Precious McKesson, was



recently elected by her peers to lead the State Party Executive Directors Association. With her role, she is pushing for institutional change in the state party infrastructure to ensure the staff have the training, tools, and support to

help Democrats win more races. She is leading not just in Nebraska but nationwide to reform our party.

Holding these seats enables us to push our party to make historic investments in state parties. Investments in not just battleground states but ALL states and territories that are key to our collective success. We are moving forward with renewed focus on young people, communities of color, and rural America, talking to voters where they are and about the issues that matter to them, and registering Democrats everywhere. Last year alone, our state party registered 10,000 new voters!

What does all this building and fundraising mean?

-Grown from 503 to 1,027

Democrats elected across the state

-Outraised the Nebraska Republicans since 2022.

-Our win rate is 71%.

-Went from 35 county parties to 57.

-Young Dems had 3 chapters, and now they have 18.

-Over 650 Block Captains are talking to 50 voters assigned to each of them—in their neighborhoods—all year, every year, not just 3 months before an election.

-Ballots were being returned at 81% and now that's 97% because of our aggressive chase program.

-We fund and implement real voter engagement programs from our Block Captains to Voter Guides to Vote-By-Mail and Voter Registration. All of these programs are increasing voter turnout.

We are experiencing record fundraising, strong candidate recruitment, and a growing county and state party infrastructure. With this success, we are committed to ending one-party Republican rule across our state to ensure that when we say we are growing the good life, we mean for ALL Nebraskans, not just the wealthy and well-connected.



We are proving that years of hard work at the local and state levels are preparing us for this very moment.

This year, we plan on:

-Winning congressional races!

-Increasing our numbers in the legislature to 17 so we can block the cruel bills Republicans continue to push.

-Winning the Governor's race against Pillen, who has taken our state backwards.

-Continuing to build at the local and county level offices—this is our bench, this is our future.

As Democrats, we are rarely single-issue voters because we care about our neighbors, families, and communities. RURAL NEBRASKA DESERVES BETTER: WHY I LEFT THE REPUBLICAN PARTY

I have farmed my whole life, and I was a Republican for most of it, just like my parents. As we watched the state and country change, they saw the Republican party shift in ways they couldn't support and became Democrats. I'm proud of them. They're long gone, but I fundamentally agreed with their thinking and finally changed my registration a few years back. I don't regret it in the least.

I grew up in the dairy business, milking 150 cows a day and running the second generation of our family's dairy business. It was not only a good business for our family, it was also good for our community. Small dairy farms like ours are nearly all gone, replaced by a few huge operations while our rural communities are hollowed out. Today, there's not a single dairy in three of the surrounding counties in my area, and only two or three are left in my county. The loss of these small dairies is just one of the many profound changes that we continue to feel in our rural communities. We see the effects of all this consolidation, the loss of services, as well as the exodus of leadership and workforce. It's tough to watch it and it's tough to live it!

Since 2020, in our state, we have lost 19 nursing homes, 15 of which were in rural communities! Medicare and Medicaid are critical to those facilities, to rural families,

and to our rural hospitals. Losing a nursing home means our loved ones and elderly neighbors are shipped off to counties farther away, families can't visit, and our small towns lose dozens of jobs.

New cuts to Medicare and Medicaid drive another nail in the coffin of our rural senior care. Closing these nursing homes and losing healthcare services is not just a policy issue for me. It's deeply personal. We fought hard to keep our local nursing home alive. The people there are our friends and family. Gutting these federal programs while handing out tax cuts to billionaires isn't just cruel, it's more than I can stomach. It is unconscionable that we are allowing these closures to happen. Our delegation in Congress voted for these cuts! Do you want to see more nursing homes close? I don't!

With these cuts to Medicare and Medicaid, our hospitals and clinics are up against the wall. They will have to make further cuts to service. How far do you want to drive when your husband or wife has a cancer appointment or a heart attack?! How do we expect young families to stay in rural communities with a two-hour drive to deliver a baby? Do you want to see more rural hospitals struggle and cut services? I don't.

Meanwhile, corporations and monopolies are squeezing family farmers. The Packers and Stockyards Act was supposed

to protect us, but now the enforcement is being gutted. The Act was supposed to ensure fair competition in the beef market but now these big companies manipulate markets and face few, if any, consequences. We see consolidation, price gouging, and fewer options for consumers and small family businesses. Our local independent mechanics can't fix tractors anymore because manufacturers hold the rights to repair hostage. That's not capitalism, it's corporate control. How do your grocery prices look? My farm expenses are astronomical!

Our representatives stood by while the USDA was slashed, programs were cut, and key offices were moved to force staff resignations. Our local county USDA offices are overwhelmed with work, strangled by lack of support from our elected representatives in Washington, and chronically understaffed. Now our DC delegation is nowhere to be found as the administration announces they will splinter the entire USDA agency in a restructuring no one asked for! Do you want to drive across two counties to a USDA Service Center? I don't!

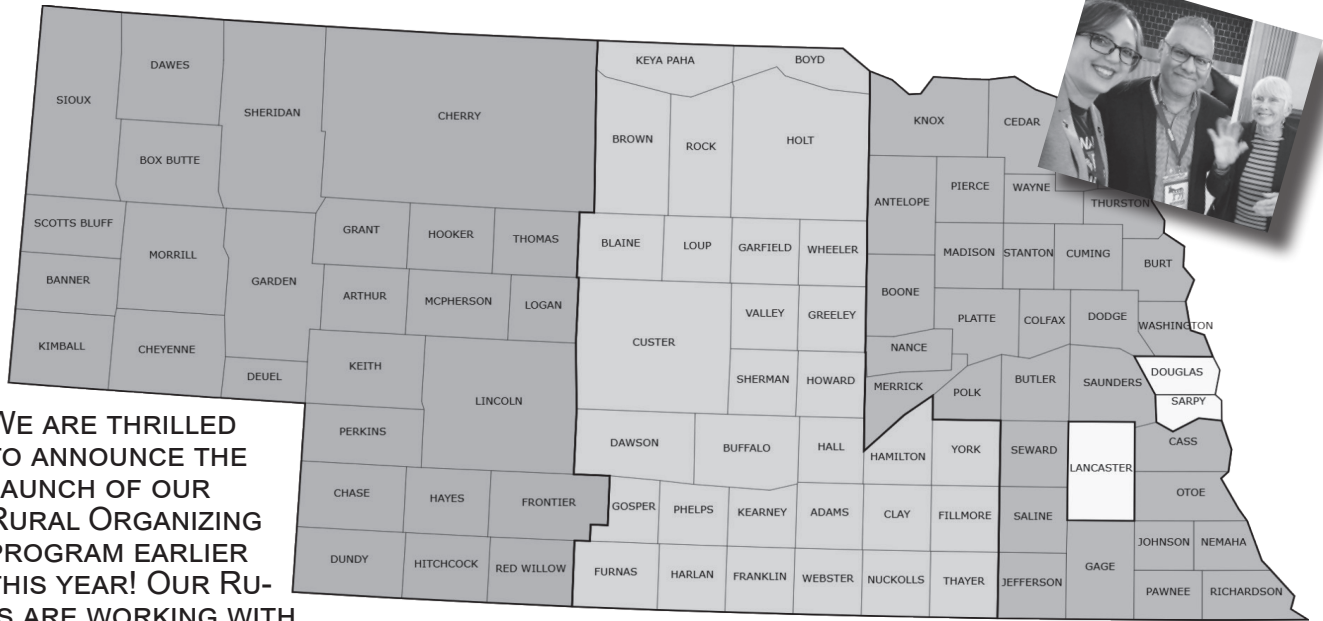
Faith is a big part of many rural communities. I attend the church I grew up in as a child, where I've been a Sunday school teacher and directed the church choir for over 20 years. My faith directs me to care about my community, to care about people who can't take

care of themselves, and to care about strangers. The idea that the GOP owns religious faith is un-American. Do you want a political party to dictate your faith practice? No thank you, I don't.

From better crop yields to life-saving medicine, science and education are cornerstones of rural communities, but Republicans continue to undermine both. They devalue public education and push our tax dollars into private schools where there is no accountability. In rural Nebraska communities, most people cannot even get to a private school. Nebraskans do not like the idea that we're going to take our public tax dollars and invest them in private schools. Nebraskans voted NO! yet our Republicans in Congress added it to the budget bill...directly contradicting our vote! Talk about a slap in our face!

The truth is, rural Nebraska is being left behind. It's not by accident, it's by Republican policy. If we want to save our rural communities, support our families, and give our kids a reason to stay, we must speak up. We have to vote like it matters. Republicans in office are not listening to you and me. Yeah... I'm a Democrat!

El Gran y Hermoso Desastre de Trump - Trump's Big Beautiful Disaster

Todos hemos visto en la televisión y el internet las detenciones ilegales e inconstitucionales de nuestros hermanos y hermanas inmigrantes en todo el país desde que Trump asumió la presidencia. Horas de grabaciones muestran a agentes de ICE deteniendo brutalmente a personas, rompiendo ventanas de autos, persiguiendo a nuestros paisanos trabajadores por los campos agrícolas, y amenazando a familiares o personas inocentes durante estas detenciones. We have all seen illegal and unconstitutional apprehensions on television and the internet of our immigrant brothers and sisters across the nation since Trump took office. Hours of footage of ICE agents brutally detaining, breaking car windows, chasing hard-working paisanos across produce fields, and threatening bystanders or loved ones during detainments. Due to an arbitrary goal of 3,000 daily apprehensions by Trump's chief of staff, Stephen Miller, ICE agents have essentially ignored civil rights and due process. ICE agents can racially profile anyone on the street and kidnap them into unknown detention centers and deport them at their convenience, even to unknown countries in some cases. The majority of those profiled are of Latino descent, despite assertions to the contrary by agency heads.

While an all-out attack on immigrants and Latinos plays

Solo mira estos números del Congreso (CBO): más de 4 billones de dólares se añadirán a la deuda nacional. Más de 78,000 habitantes de Nebraska perderán su seguro médico por varias razones, como requisitos más estrictos en los programas o aumento en los costos de las primas. Esto afectará a nuestros ancianos, personas con discapacidad, veteranos

out, another attack by the Trump Administration on working families began on July 4th of this year with the passage of the Big, Beautiful Bill (officially H.R.1). The bill is anything but beautiful.

For starters, it will be the biggest transfer of wealth from working-class families to the ultra-wealthy in the form of tax breaks. Consider some of these numbers from the Congressional Budget Office (CBO). Over \$4 trillion will be added to the national debt. Over 78,000 Nebraskans will lose their healthcare for a variety of reasons, including stricter program requirements and overall insurance premium increases. This will affect our elderly, the disabled, our veterans, and so many more. The nearly trillion (yes, trillion) dollars being cut by the bill will end nutritional assistance for thousands of children who rely on SNAP (food stamps) in our state. It will force hospitals in rural Nebraska to close. When you consider that 44% of rural hospitals are already operating at

y muchas más familias. ¿Y lo más irónico? Los recortes en programas como SNAP y Medicaid no entrarán en vigor hasta después de las elecciones legislativas del 2026. ¿Por qué? Porque los republicanos no quieren ser culpados por las consecuencias devastadoras del presupuesto de Trump. En resumen, retrasaron los efectos más negativos de la ley para asegurarse de ser reelectos en noviembre del 2026.

Y por si fuera poco, Trump y los republicanos del Congreso han aprobado más de 170 billón de dólares para actividades relacionadas con inmigración y control fronterizo. ¡30 billón se destinarán a redadas de ICE y más detenciones (van a contratar 10,000 agentes nuevos), y 45 billón para construir y mantener centros de detención! Todo esto con el



a loss (according to the Nebraska Hospital Association), the bill puts a nail in the coffin for many. Two hospitals have already announced their closures due to the bill.

Here is the most ironic part of the bill. The tax breaks for the wealthy went into effect as soon as the bill was signed. The cuts to funding for SNAP and Medicaid will take effect AFTER the 2026 midterm elections. Why? Because Republicans do not want to be held accountable for voting for Trump's budget bill and its disastrous effects on the most vulnerable. In short, Republicans delayed the most negative provisions of the bill so that THEY could be re-elected in November 2026.

In addition, Trump and Congressional Republicans have given over \$170 billion in funding for immigration and border enforcement-related activity! \$30 billion will go to ICE raids and apprehensions (10,000

more agents will be hired), and \$45 billion will go to building and maintaining detention centers. Their whole point is cruelty towards our immigrant brothers and sisters. As an immigrant myself, I see and feel these direct attacks on millions who help keep this country moving forward.

Attend local town hall meetings, Democratic County Party meetings, rallies, and protests. KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

Democrats are fierce defenders of your rights to vote, to choose, and to live freely and with dignity. Our government must protect these freedoms for everyone, not just the billionaires and special interest groups. This is your guide to knowing and defending your rights because the good life belongs to all Nebraskans.

Immigration Rights

- Everyone in this country has rights under the US Constitution, regardless of what the current administration would like people to believe.
- You have the right to remain silent- Inform agents that you are exercising that right, then STOP TALKING.
- Remain calm and do not run away- Running away is probable cause to arrest you.
- You have the right to speak with a lawyer if you are placed in ICE custody and do not sign anything without speaking to an attorney first.

Know your Voting Rights

Voter ID

- You **MUST** have a Nebraska ID (or a US passport) to vote in Nebraska
 - If you work for the state, county, city, or a public school, your staff ID can be used for voting
- ID must have your **NAME AND PHOTO**
- It **CAN** be expired
- It does not need to have an address

If you have been convicted of a felony

- You regain your right to vote after serving your sentence
- You must submit a new voter registration application to your county election office after you have served your sentence
- You **CANNOT** vote if you are incarcerated, on parole, or on probation

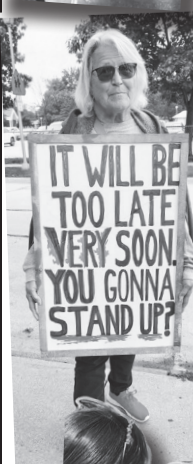

Your Rights as a Protester

- You have the right to protest peacefully in public spaces (streets, sidewalks, parks).
- Speech cannot be restricted based on content.
- Permits are usually not required for sidewalk protests if you don't block traffic.
- Permits may be needed for large events, street blockages, or amplified sound.
- You cannot protest on private property without permission.
- Police cannot confiscate or delete your photos or videos without a warrant.
- If stopped, ask "Am I free to leave?" If yes, walk away calmly.
- You have the right to remain silent and to ask for a lawyer.
- You do not have to consent to a search.
- Stay calm, keep hands visible, and don't resist arrest.
- Document violations: take note of badge numbers, take photos, get witness info.

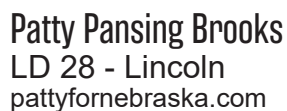

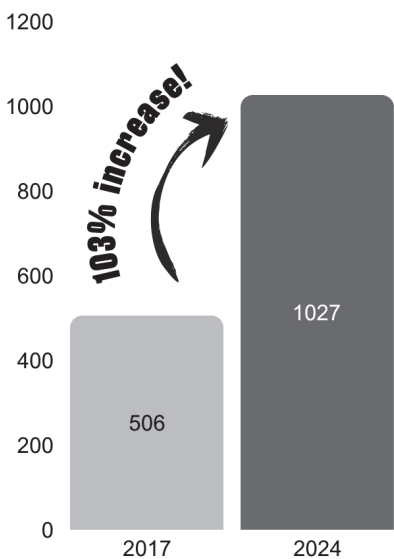

YOUR COMMUNITY NEEDS YOU - RUN FOR LOCAL OFFICE

Running for office is daunting. I often hear, "Am I capable?" or "Is it even worth my time?" when I ask someone to consider a run. Those doubts are normal. The harder question is where to begin.

My own interest started young. As a kid, I met Governor Ben Nelson. In middle school, I wrote letters to Senator Ernie Chambers after learning about his filibusters. In high school, I followed legislative budgets and watched the Governor's Office closely. By college, I had applied three times before finally becoming a legislative page. That experience showed me that a political career can start at the local level.

Too often, people aim for "big" offices with titles and spotlights. If you care about shaping your community, the greatest impact comes from local offices. In Nebraska, a "local control" state, city councils, school boards, and natural resources districts make decisions that affect daily life more than most realize.

I considered all three. The Lincoln City Council does important work, but the competitiveness of those races and frequent changes to my precinct made it a tough fit. I thought about the school board, inspired by my grandmother, a sixth-grade teacher, and my friend Barb Baier, who showed me how vital school boards are for everything from workforce development to social justice. I

respect school board members because their work is essential, yet often thankless. Still, as a single, childless cat parent, I did not think I was the right messenger.

That left the Natural Resources District. NRD members are often seen as "gatekeepers of groundwater," but the NRD does far more. Created more than 50 years ago when the Legislature handed local control of water, land, and wildlife to districts, the NRD plays a critical role in conservation and resource management.

In 2016, I considered running when I saw an open seat, but the incumbent endorsed another candidate. A year later, another incumbent announced retirement and encouraged me to attend

meetings. I did. In 2018, I ran and won.

Serving on the Lower Platte South NRD has been deeply rewarding. It is a low-profile office, but it is where I can make a real difference without the noise of partisan politics or term limits erasing institutional knowledge. I plan to run again in 2026 because I believe in what we do and how much it matters to Lincoln and the surrounding communities.

If you are thinking about running for office, do not overlook the local level. Whether it is a school board, city council, or the NRD, these roles shape our communities in profound ways. You do not need a spotlight to make a difference. You just need to start somewhere.

You're welcome.

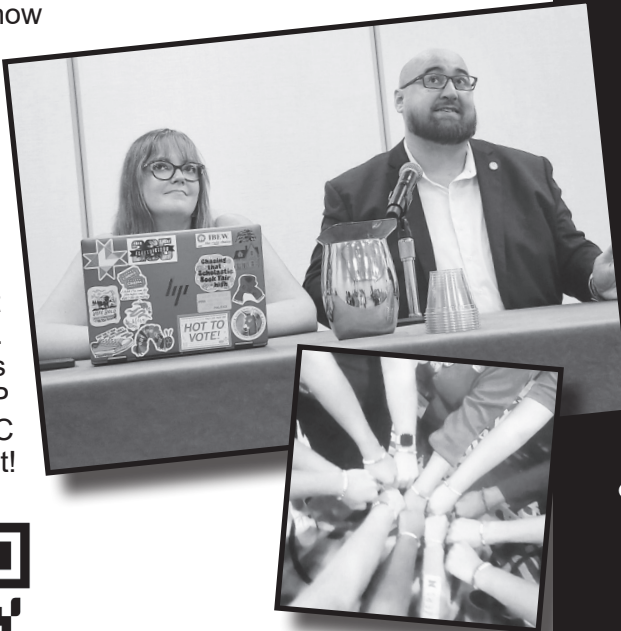
We're the only state with a unicameral, nonpartisan legislature—and yet we keep electing progressive champions like YDA alum Senator Dunixi Guereca.

ENVISIONING A BETTER FUTURE FOR ALL: WHY I'M A YOUNG DEMOCRAT

I was raised in a household where our values shaped our politics, not the other way around. My father, the son of an Irish immigrant and a university professor, and my mother, the daughter of an attorney and a nurse practitioner, passed along a strong belief in education, service, and fighting for the solutions to problems you see. Political conversations in our house were grounded in science, lived experience, and a sense of duty to others. Our values, rooted in both personal history and public service, led me to the Democratic Party.

Science has always been more than just a subject—it's a worldview. With a theoretical physicist for a father and a biologist for a mother, I learned early on that evidence matters. Scientists are not fueled by ideology; they continually drive towards collaborative discovery, facing fierce peer reviews and stringent methodology requirements along the way. This is why it's been heartbreaking to watch as politicians continue to ignore or deny the proven reality of a world with increasingly acidic oceans, rising sea levels, and increasingly extreme climatic events. Climate change is not a distant threat; it's already here. And while others

stall or retreat, Democrats have been the party that has pushed for urgent, science-based solutions to protect our planet and future generations.

I also believe in people and giving them the tools to succeed. My father teaches at a local community college where many

of his students navigate school while working long hours, raising children, or becoming the first in their families to attend college. Through him, I've heard countless stories of perseverance—students who once held extensive doubt in their capabilities going on to attend top universities or take on elusive and innovative careers. Those stories aren't just anecdotes; they prove that investing in others transforms lives. That belief in humanity—no matter where someone comes from or starts from—is a key stance and value of the Democratic Party.

My educational path also reflects the necessity of strong public institutions. I attended Title I middle and high schools in Lincoln, both of which benefited from the Every Student Succeeds Act and other Democrat-supported

educational policies. My success in school wasn't solely in the hands of teachers or my textbooks—it was made possible by public investment and policy decisions made by leaders who prioritized access and equity. That support opened doors I didn't even know existed. One example of this was the opportunity for me to graduate

from the rigorous International Baccalaureate program, offered by Lincoln High School, without paying a dime. The doors that opened for me throughout my youth have been overwhelmingly propped open by democratic policies, both locally and federally.

Just as my educational opportunities helped frame my thinking, so did my community. Lincoln has long been a welcoming place for refugees, thanks in part to local and federal Democratic policies. I grew up surrounded by classmates and neighbors from all corners of the world—Yazidi, South Sudanese, Karen, Vietnamese, Afghan, Ukrainian, Syrian, and Iraqi families, among many others. These friendships didn't just teach me about different cultures; they taught me empathy. They ingrained the understanding that behind every resettlement statistic is a family seeking safety, dignity, and hope. Nebraska now ranks as the country's top state in

refugee resettlement per capita, and that's not an accident. This characteristic of Nebraska is a result of Democratic leadership that has seen inclusion as a strength and is a reason I am proud to call Nebraska home.

One of my earliest memories of political involvement was of standing alongside my grandmother at a pro-choice protest. She's long been a vocal advocate for abortion access nationwide, fighting back against encroachments on the right she saw put into law over 50 years ago. Even as a child, I understood the basic principle: people should have the freedom to make decisions about their bodies. Like most kids, I didn't like being told what to do, which made the freedom of choice intuitive to me. Over the years, I've listened to numerous stories from individuals whose lives were changed by having the freedom to choose. I've grown to understand how vital that right is—not just as an ideology, but in practice.

For me, being a Democrat isn't just political. It's about holding compassion, community, and courage in my heart. It's about believing that the government can and should be a force for positive change—whether in a classroom, a courtroom, or a resettlement center. I'm a Democrat because I believe in facts over fear, optimism over contempt, and most of all, people. I am proud to fight for a Lincoln, a Nebraska, and a country that works for everyone with no exceptions.

REPUBLICAN POLICIES ARE HURTING NEBRASKA

Republicans claim to be the party of small government and the working people. Ever since Trump became their preeminent leader, the Republican Party has become a party in pursuit of absolute power. Republicans have become more radical in their crusade to "Make America Great Again." Their pursuit of a great and powerful country has come at a terrible price to the people who voted and supported them, including 59.3% of Nebraskans.

I live in the small town of McCook to enjoy a more affordable cost of living, support my mother in paying off the house we own together, and help her retire comfortably. The town of McCook, which voted overwhelmingly in favor of Trump, will likely feel the effects of harmful Republican policies sooner rather than later.

Recently, the Curtis hospital announced it would be closing due to budget cuts expected from Trump's "Big Beautiful Bill".

This rural hospital, affiliated with McCook Community Hospital, provides access to life-saving care for thousands of rural residents in Southwestern Nebraska.

McCook's water comes from an alluvial aquifer from the Republican River that is pumped from nine wells. The town's outdated lead pipes risk poisoning all residents who depend on this water, requiring many, including my own family, to install a reverse osmosis filtration system. Within the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL) passed

under the Biden administration, additional funds were allocated to replace all lead service pipes. Unfortunately, funding for this initiative has been paused under the current Republican-controlled Senate, perpetuating these health risks in McCook and the countless other places that rely on outdated infrastructure.

Additionally, Nebraska, and

particularly its rural schools, are dependent upon federal funding for their improvement. This will strip funding from public schools, which are fundamental to the education and development of young Americans. These cuts will lead to the degradation of local McCook schools, where we educate the next generation of McCook residents. Some of these same cuts will also defund food supplies, depriving low-income citizens of necessities. These federal budget cuts will threaten the livelihoods of our fellow Nebraskans.

Republican lawmakers have long leaned into the negative aspects of cannabis and hemp, choosing to oversimplify the topic and ignore the economic and social potential they have for the state of Nebraska. Hemp is an incredibly versatile crop that can be utilized as a construction material for textiles and ropes, as well as oil for painting and cooking. Hemp seeds are a rich source of

protein for humans and animals. Despite the agricultural potential that hemp has, it is subject to strict regulations made by politicians who oppose cannabis. Medicinal Cannabis was approved by the voters in 2024. The medical use of cannabis, based upon comprehensive studies, can provide life-changing pain relief for a variety of physical and mental conditions that will help many patients including members of my own family. This hyperregulation strips opportunity and relief from Nebraskans and further illustrates that our voices are not being heard.

Now that Trump and Republicans are back in power nationally, we are seeing more policies that deprive citizens of their rights, harm the American economy, and violate the US Constitution. Nebraskans will not be spared from the abuses that are to come under this administration. We must come together to protect the land of the free by fighting against these policies.

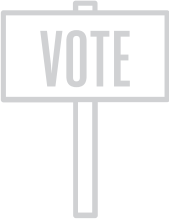
